# \*\*FROM THE NURSE'S OFFICE Mrs. Beebe

With the cold and flu season just around the corner, here are some tips to help minimize the spread of illness among the students. Any child with a temperature over 100 degrees should stay home from school until the temperature has been normal without medicine for 24 hours. Any child that has had vomiting, diarrhea or a harsh, persistent cough should also remain at home until they have been symptom free for 24 hours. Please encourage frequent hand washing to help prevent the spread of infections.

# HAWK-I? WHAT'S THAT?

Some families do not have health insurance benefits offered through their work place. Good health insurance programs such as the Hawk-I insurance program can meet the need for health coverage for your children. Hawk-I provides health insurance to uninsured/underinsured kids whose parents make too much money to qualify for Medicaid or cannot afford private or employer-based health insurance. If you would like more information about Hawk-I insurance, contact your school nurse or call 1-800-257-8563.

Temperatures are changing - please remember to dress your child appropriately. Hats, gloves, scarves, warm coats for the cold days, snow pants and boots must be worn if your child wants to play in the snow during recess. The school does not have an abundance of extra clothing or jackets. We go outside every day during the winter months as long as the wind chill is 15 and above, and the playground has been plowed. If your child does not have the proper attire for the weather, they will not be permitted to play in the snow. # NEWS FROM PE

Mr. Swanson

Have you asked your child lately, "What did you do in PE today?"? Chances are they will enjoy telling you about the variety of activities and skills they are learning. They may forget to tell you how they were developing their brains through their physical activity! Research shows healthy, active students learn faster, score higher, and miss less school than those who are sedentary. In PE at Hubbell, we try to give our students a workout each day through a fun activity, even though the students may not even realize they are exercising. We emphasize increasing our heart rate through various games and movement.

A reminder to make sure your child has on proper PE shoes on those days they come to the gym. For their safety, we ask they wear no flip-flops, sandals, Crocs, or boots. Proper shoes should be soft and flat on the bottom, toes and heel completely covered, and shoes should be connected to the foot by Velcro, shoestrings, or some sort of attachment. # CREATIONS FROM THE ART ROOM Mrs. Ethington

**Kindergarten** learned that sometimes artists break the rules to create new and different art. We studied Van Gogh's "Starry Night" and created our own "Starry Night". They have learned some art vocabulary: portrait, still life, landscape, sculpture, and abstract. We created classroom quilts using line as decoration. Line and shape have been our main focus and texture will be next.

1<sup>st</sup>graders studied Vincent Van Gogh's "Sunflower" paintings and created their own with oil pastels. They included pattern in their sunflowers and learned the difference between warm and cool colors. Right now they are creating Monster Collages inspired by the book "Monsters Don't Eat Broccoli".

**2<sup>nd</sup>graders** got to use digital cameras and take portraits of one another. They used these photos to make Pop Art Portraits. Ask them if they can identify a Pop Art artist! We just finished paintings in the impressionist style of Claude Monet. Students did landscape paintings including a pond with lily pads. The Des Moines Art Center has a wonderful Claude Monet painting they might like to see. Remember the Des Moines Art Center is open on Saturday and Sunday and is free to the public.

**3<sup>rd</sup>grader**. To connect with their unit on health third graders created Pop Art Sandwiches and learned about pop artist Andy Warhol.

**4<sup>th</sup>graders** studied the classical elements of air, fire, earth, and water. We connected these 4 elements to sources of energy. Each student created 4"x4" mixed media representations of the elements, using line, shape, and color.

5<sup>th</sup>graders decorated their art folders with art supplies. Their next project is coil pots which includes rolling coils, connecting the coils, and creating designs. The pots will be fired in the kiln, glazed, and fired again. This is a huge amount of work Watch for them to come home the end of October.

# NEWS FROM THE COUNSELOR Ms. Bentley K-5 Counseling

We started the first three weeks of the year with our Happy New Year lessons during classroom guidance which helped students focus on useful skills needed for success in school. Now we are we discussing how to make and keep friends and explored qualities that are needed in a good friendship. Literature is usually a part of every lesson. Students are given the opportunity to express experiences, ideas, and new understandings by sharing in pairs, small and whole group or through writing.

We just finished our Personal Safety unit. For the primary unit this included stranger safety and ways to keep themselves safe in different situations. For the secondary unit, we discussed what to do if they're home alone, stranger safety, and how to be assertive and say no in different situations such as peer pressure. The elementary guidance counselors in Des Moines are teaching their lessons in the same sequence so that children who move around the district will be studying the same unit when they arrive at their new school.

# 2014-2015 School Year PATRON NOTIFICATION Between District Open Enrollment Iowa Administrative Code 281-17.3(2)

Parents/Guardians considering the use of the open enrollment option to enroll their children in <u>another</u> public school district in the state of Iowa should be aware of the following dates:

#### DEADLINES:

March 1, 2014 is the last date for regular open enrollment requests for the 2014-2015 school year.

September 1, 2014 is the last date for open enrollment requests for entering kindergarten students and those students falling under the "good cause" definition for the 2014-2015 school year. To insure that the transfer of individual students does not adversely affect the diversity plan of the District, certain limitations to open enrollment have been established. Parents of kindergarten students are therefore encouraged to make application requests prior to March 1, 2014.

# APPEALS:

Within 30 days of a denial of an open enrollment request by the DMPS Board of Education, a parent/guardian may file an appeal with the state board of education only if the open enrollment request was based on repeated acts of harassment or a serious health condition of the student that the district cannot adequately address. All other denials must be appealed to the district court in Polk County.

# ATHLETIC ELIGIBILITY:

In most cases, a high school student who open enrolls is <u>ineligible</u> for varsity athletic competition during the student's first 90 consecutive school days of enrollment in the receiving district. Some, but not all, exceptions to this general rule of ineligibility are as follows:

- 1. The sending district does not offer the sport in question.
- 2. The sending district was dissolved and merged with one or more other districts.
- 3. The sending district whole-grade shares with another district for the student's grade level.

#### TRANSPORTATION:

Parents/Guardians of students open enrolled <u>from</u> <u>another</u> <u>school</u> <u>district</u> are eligible for transportation assistance if the household income of the parent/guardian is at or below the federal poverty guidelines for household size. <u>The two</u> <u>districts must be contiguous</u>. Assistance may be in the form of actual transportation or in the form of a cash stipend. Information regarding transportation eligibility and a complete copy of the District's open enrollment policy and procedures may be obtained from the Open Enrollment Office, 1301 Second Ave., Des Moines, Iowa 50314

# <u>Kindergarten</u>

The Kindergarten students will be learning body parts and senses to go along with their current IB unit – Our senses help us explore our environment. A fun way to practice at home is to have your student teach you the body parts. Then you can play a game of *Simon Says* in Spanish. "Simón dice toca <u>la cabeza</u>." Muchas gracias for encouraging your child as they learn another language. Your support makes all of the difference.

# First Grade

The first graders are learning vocabulary to go along with their current IB unit – Interdependence within a community is impacted by the roles people play. They will also begin to understand the importance of gender in the Spanish language. Please ask your child to practice their Spanish skills at home as well. ¡Gracias!

# Second Grade

The second graders will be reviewing the roles of members in a community that they learned last year. They will also be learning words for buildings to go along with their current IB unit– People in a community share common resources to meet their needs. One way to practice at home is to see how many buildings your child can identify in Spanish as you drive around town. ¡Gracias!

# <u>Third Grade</u>

Third graders are learning vocabulary to go along with their IB unit – Health is affected by the choices we make. The new vocabulary will include many fruits (las frutas), vegetables (las verduras), proteins (los carnes y frijoles), dairy (los productos lacteos), grains (los granos) and fats (las grasas). They will also be practicing how to look up new words in Spanish by themselves!

# Fourth Grade

Fourth graders will be focusing on vocabulary related to everyday living in a home. They will get to practice their computer skills to translate vocabulary commonly used at home as well as talk about different types of homes. This will also give them an authentic opportunity to use the Spanish vocabulary they have already learned in previous years. Please encourage your child to tell you the names for things around your house to practice. ¡Gracias!

# <u>Fifth Grade</u>

Fifth grade will be learning vocabulary to go along with their IB unit – Marketplaces depend on the ability to produce goods and supply services that can be exchanged. They will practice talking about money in Spanish and be practicing the vocabulary for buildings commonly used to supply services and exchange goods. Please encourage your child to work on the building vocabulary at home as well as numbers. ¡Gracias!

Appreciation: Appreciating the wonder and beauty of the world and its people.

<u>Commitment</u>: Being committed to learning, persevering and showing self-discipline and responsibility.

<u>Confidence</u>: Feeling confident in their ability as learners, having the courage to take risks, applying what they have learned and making appropriate decisions and choices.

Cooperation: Cooperating, collaborating, and leading or following as the situation demands.

<u>Creativity</u>: Being creative and imaginative in their thinking and in their approach to problems and dilemmas.

Curiosity: Being curious about the nature of learning, about the world, its people and cultures.

<u>Empathy</u>: Imagining themselves in another's situation in order to understand his or her reasoning and emotions, so as to be open-minded and reflective about the perspectives of others.

Enthusiasm: Enjoying learning and willingly putting the effort into the process.

<u>Independence</u>: Thinking and acting independently, making their own judgments based on reasoned argument, and being able to defend their judgments.

Integrity: Being honest and demonstrating a considered sense of fairness.

Respect: Respecting themselves, others and the world around them.

<u>Tolerance</u>: Being sensitive about differences and diversity in the world and being responsive to the needs of others.
