### Guidelines Regarding Head Lice Mrs. Beebe

Parents: This time of year head lice occurs more often. Common signs and symptoms to watch for include: intense itching of the scalp, adult lice (that can be very tiny at first) which may be found behind the ears and along the back of the neck, and lice eggs (nits) which can be mistaken as dandruff but don't brush off. Getting lice isn't a sign of bad hygiene or an unclean living environment. It most commonly spreads through close personal contact and by sharing personal belongings. There are many over the counter products for treatment and if symptoms persist you can contact your doctor. The Iowa Department of Public Health recommends a 14

day treatment regime. Guidelines for students with head lice:

- Students can be screened on an individual basis, but the Des Moines Public Schools no longer does routine mass screenings for head lice
- Parents are encouraged to regularly screen their children for lice. It should be assumed that head lice are in the community and schools at all times. Spend 15 minutes each week on each child carefully looking for head lice or nits. Persons with nits within \(\frac{1}{4}\) inch of the scalp OR live lice should be treated. Careful use of a nit comb can potentially remove all lice. Each child should have his or her own comb or brush. Teach your child NOT to share hats, scarves, brushes, combs, and hair fasteners.
- Any child found to have head lice can finish the school day and be treated that evening at home
- Child's parent will be notified
- Child must be treated in order to return to school the next day
- "No-nits" policies that require a child to be free of nits before they can return to school are not recommended. Children should not be excluded from school. Head lice can be a nuisance but have not been shown to spread disease.

### CREATIONS FROM THE ART ROOM

Hubbell will be represented at the annual Des Moines Public Schools Art Exhibit by: Kindergartner Vivi Fonseca, 1<sup>st</sup> grader Ava Consorti,  $3^{rd}$  grader Gryzelle Opog, and  $4^{th}$  grader Arpan Kapoor. The exhibit will be held February 6-12 in the foyer of Capital Square.

Kindergarten will be learning about creativity, a perfect fit for the art classroom. To connect with their "How We Express Ourselves Unit" they will mix colors and paint hearts in the style of Pop Artist Peter Max.

1st graders will learn about Cave Art. They will study how the caveman used symbols in their paintings. Students will create their own piece of Cave Art using symbols, texture, and clay hand prints.

Second graders are finishing up their Personality Drawings that tied into their last unit of Who We Are. They have created symbols and lines to represent themselves and are using oil pastels for color. We are learning how to use the color wheel to help us blend colors.

Third graders are creating paper mache masks out of a Chinette paper plate. These masks are a lot of fun and take up to two months to complete.

Fourth graders just finished working with clay to create Pop Art Pizzas. After the clay pizzas dry, they will fired in the kiln and then painted with watercolors. We learned about pop artist Andy Warhol.

Fifth graders are working on Starry Night paintings. They learned about the artist Vincent Van Gogh and other artists that have done parodies of Starry Night. Students chose an object to be in the foreground of their Starry Night Sky.

### What is so special about IB programs?

- IB programs are recognized around the world and ensure an increased adaptability and mobility for IB students.
- The curriculum and pedagogy of IB programs focus on international perspectives of learning and teaching, while insisting that students fully explore their home culture and language.
- IB World Schools must undergo an exhaustive authorization process in order to offer one or more of the programs, which includes a study of the school's resources and commitment to the IB mission and philosophy.
- IB teachers participate in a wide variety of professional development opportunities to constantly update their knowledge and share their expertise with colleagues around the world.
- Many students graduating from the Diploma Program find that it enhances their
  opportunities at tertiary institutions. The IB works closely with universities around the
  world to gain recognition for IB programs.
- The core components of IB programs encourage students to participate in creative and service-oriented activities, while at the same time emphasizing the importance of reflection on a personal and academic level.

### Kindergarten
