FROM THE NURSE'S OFFICE Mrs. Beebe

With cold and flu season approaching, students may be bringing medication to school. Please remember that ALL prescription and nonprescription medications must be sent to school in the original container. Non-prescription (over-thecounter) medication must include a note from a parent AND the doctor indicating the name of the medicine, the dosage, and how many days the medicine should be given. Prescription medicine must be sent with the prescription label attached and requires only written parental/guardian consent. If a prescription medication is to be given, please ask the pharmacist for an extra bottle for school, and send just the amount needed for school use. All medication must be kept in the nurse's office. Students are not permitted to have medication in their possession during the school day. If you have any questions, please call the nurse's office.

GUIDELINES REGARDING HEAD LICE

Parents: This time of year head lice occurs more often. Common signs and symptoms to watch for include: intense itching of the scalp, adult lice (that can be very tiny at first) which may be found behind the ears and along the back of the neck, and lice eggs (nits) which can be mistaken as dandruff but don't brush off. Getting lice isn't a sign of bad hygiene or an unclean living environment. It most commonly spreads through close personal contact and by sharing personal belongings. There are many over the counter products for treatment and if symptoms persist you can contact your doctor. The Iowa Department of Public Health recommends a 14 day treatment regime. Guidelines for students with head lice:

* Students can be screened on an individual basis, but the Des Moines Public Schools no longer does routine mass screenings for head lice

* Parents are encouraged to regularly screen their children for lice. It should be assumed that head lice are in the community and schools at all times. Spend 15 minutes each week on each child carefully looking for head lice or nits. Persons with nits within $\frac{1}{4}$ inch of the scalp OR live lice should be treated. Careful use of a nit comb can potentially remove all lice. Each child should have his or her own comb or brush. Teach your child NOT to share hats, scarves, brushes, combs, and hair fasteners.

* Any child found to have head lice can finish the school day and be treated that evening at home

* Child's parent will be notified

* Child must be treated in order to return to school the next day

* "No-nits" policies that require a child to be free of nits before they can return to school are not recommended. Children should not be excluded from school. Head lice can be a nuisance but have not been shown to spread disease.

CREATIONS FROM THE ART ROOM Mrs. Bash

Kindergarten will be learning about and working with clay. Clay comes from the earth. When we work with clay we like it wet and soft so that it can be shaped. We will add texture and pattern to clay. When clay is dry it breaks easily but when baked in a special oven called a kiln it becomes hard. The last step will be adding a glaze to our clay, this also needs to be fired in the kiln.

1st grade will be making pinch pots out of clay. Our pinch pots will have a design along the edge and be glazed. We will also be finishing our selfportraits.

2nd Graders have been learning about Graffiti Art and looking at the artist Keith Harring. They are finishing up warm and cool colored action figures in the style of Keith Harring using contour lines.

3rd Graders have been creating mosaic flower arrangements using bits of torn paper. They are putting the finishing touches on them and applying a glaze to seal them.

4th Graders learned all about weaving and how a loom is used to create large works of functional art. They are weaving their own small rug using a cardboard loom.

5th Graders are learning the art of basket weaving using coiling core and yarn. They will be making a small basket over the next few weeks.

What's happening in PE these days? Hubbell's students continue to get their exercise and learn about its benefit to the body through fun games and activities during their class time. You can help by making sure that your child gets to participate by wearing appropriate shoes for their own safety on their PE days. Just a reminder that boots of any kind can be unsafe and are not suitable for PE class. Winter months sometimes lead to inactivity for our students. One way to help with this is to combine television with exercise. Suggest to your child activities like stretching, exercises, running in place, rope jumping, etc. while watching television. Combining these two should make exercise more fun and beneficial!

This year Hubbell students have the opportunity to SOAR as they demonstrate learner profile traits throughout the school day. Each week Hubbell teachers are watching all students for a specific learner profile trait that is being targeted that week. At the end of the week, two students from each classroom are recognized for demonstrating that trait and get to have their picture hung up in the front hall! The learner profile traits are: Balanced: I get involved mentally, physically, and emotionally throughout the day.

Third Grade

Third graders will be focusing on water vocabulary to go along with their IB unit. They will be focusing on verbs and will even begin the basics of conjugating verbs during this unit! The third graders will come up with their own list of water verbs to learn. This list will be available online as soon as it is made. Please feel free to practice this vocabulary by using the website with your child. One other fun way to practice at home is to play charades and *Simon Says* with the new verbs. ¡Gracias!

Fourth Grade

The current fourth grade IB unit is traditions reflect beliefs and values of a culture. To go along with this, students will learn about traditions that are common in Spanish speaking countries and share traditions common for their own family. They will also focus on calendar vocabulary and family vocabulary. Please practice family vocabulary at home if you have a chance. ¡Gracias!

<u>Fifth Grade</u>

The fifth grade students will be practicing verb conjugations to get ready for middle school Spanish. They will also use previously learned vocabulary to practice the correct use of adjectives. Remember to ask your child to share these Spanish skills with you at home. ¡Gracias!

What is an IB education?

Do you ever get questioned about what exactly is unique about your child's education in an IB school? If you have, you know the answer is not a simple one. There is so much that goes into an IB education that it is difficult to sum it all up! Here is our answer to this not-so-simple question. Our curriculum at Hubbell goes beyond filling the minds of our learners with a bunch of facts. We know our students can get all these in just a few minutes with access to google! Instead, our teachers work together to teach concepts. Here is an example of what this means:

* Fact-based teaching: Students learn about fairy tales and folk tales – the elements of the stories, examples of the stories, how to write their own fairy tale or folk tale.

* Concept-based teaching: Students read a variety of fairy tales and folk tales in order to understand that storytelling communicates messages and lessons; and that some stories are retold many times and are changed by the culture, time, and the perspective of the story teller.

Another unique aspect of the IB program is it is inquiry-based. Our teachers pose problems and situations to get students asking questions and wanting to explore the concepts. Students explore these through group work and problem solving. Students work together to research, experiment, create, and reflect. For example, in one of our fourth grade units, groups are given wire, a light bulb, a battery, and the task to make the light bulb work. Students experiment, discuss, and eventually complete the task. What better way to learn about the different forms of energy than creating it yourself? Those are lessons students will remember for years to come!
