Cultural Fair - Was a success thanks to the many parent volunteers, thank you for all your efforts to make it a celebration of our many cultures.

International Baccalaureate -We are thrilled to be serving our students as Iowa's first IB school. Please engage with your child as they work on units of inquiry, develop learner profile traits, and become worldly citizens. Our units have begun in every grade level and much more detail will come home with your child.

Traffic Safety - Please adhere to our drop off and pick up procedures. The inside lane (closest to the sidewalk) is for drop off and pick-up only. In addition, I encourage you to walk, car pool, ride bikes, or use convenient locations like the Playhouse parking lot as an option to help with traffic congestion. We have adult crossing guards in place at Boulevard Sports, 42nd & Center, and Roosevelt Footbridge every day. Please consider utilizing these options, especially if your child is older and can easily walk safely to an off-campus location.

REMINDER TO ALL PARENTS:

If your student is not eating breakfast, they will wait outside until the 8:00 bell rings. Because of limited supervision, we ask that students not be dropped off early.

ATTENDANCE POLICY REMINDERS For elementary and middle school:

Parents,
Please take a moment to review the ATTENDANCE POLICY in the parent handbook available on the DMPS website, PARENT tab, PARENT HANDBOOK link. There are a few key points we'd like to stress. Please remember that you must let your child's school know that he or she will be absent within 24 hours of the absence. Also, please carefully review the list of what are excused and unexcused absences. If you wish to take your child out of school for a vacation or non-related school event, the absence will be unexcused. You should also be aware that tardies and early withdrawals may accumulate toward a full day's absence. Attendance in school is critical to a child's education progress and the revised policy emphasizes this fact. If you have questions, please contact your building principal.

Parents, it would be helpful if you would notify the office if you are changing your child's regular after school transportation plans. Please send a note or call the office. PATRON NOTIFICATION
Between District Open Enrollment
Iowa Administrative Code 281-17.3(2)**

Parents/Guardians considering the use of the open enrollment option to enroll their children in another public school district in the state of Iowa should be aware of the following dates:

DEADLINES:

March 1, 2016 is the last date for regular open enrollment requests for the 2016-2017 school year.

September 1, 2016 is the last date for open enrollment requests for entering kindergarten students and those students falling under the "good cause" definition for the 2016-2017 school year. To insure that the transfer of individual students does not adversely affect the diversity plan of the District, certain limitations to open enrollment have been established. Parents of kindergarten students are therefore encouraged to make application requests prior to March 1, 2016.

APPEALS:

Within 30 days of a denial of an open enrollment request by the DMPS Board of Education, a parent/guardian may file an appeal with the state board of education only if the open enrollment request was based on repeated acts of harassment or a serious health condition of the student that the district cannot adequately address. All other denials must be appealed to the district court in Polk County.

ATHLETIC ELIGIBILITY:

In most cases, a high school student who open enrolls is ineligible for varsity athletic competition during the student's first 90 consecutive school days of enrollment in the receiving district. Some, but not all, exceptions to this general rule of ineligibility are as follows:

1. The sending district does not offer the sport in question.
2. The sending district was dissolved and merged with one or more other districts.
3. The sending district whole-grade shares with another district for the student's grade level.

TRANSPORTATION:

Parents/Guardians of students open enrolled from another school district are eligible for transportation assistance if the household income of the parent/guardian is at or below the federal poverty guidelines for household size. The two districts must be contiguous. Assistance may be in the form of actual transportation or in the form of a cash stipend. Padres/tutores teniendo en cuenta el uso de la opción de inscripción abierta para inscribir a sus hijos en otro distrito de la escuela pública en el estado de Iowa los padres o tutores deben ser conscientes de las siguientes fechas:

PLAZOS:

01 de Marzo de 2016 es el plazo para las solicitudes regulares de inscripción abierta para el año 2016-2017.

01 de Septiembre de 2016 es el plazo para las solicitudes de inscripción abierta para estudiantes de Kinder y los estudiantes pertenecientes a la definición de "buena causa" para el año 2016-2017. Para asegurar que la transferencia de estudiantes individuales no afecta el plan de diversidad del distrito, se han establecido ciertas limitaciones para abrir la inscripción. Los padres de los estudiantes de Kinder por lo tanto animamos a realizar solicitudes de aplicación antes de 01 de Marzo de 2016.

APELACIÓN:

Dentro de 30 días de una denegación de una solicitud de inscripción abierta por la Junta de Educación de DMPS, un padre o tutor puede presentar una apelación ante la Junta de Educación del Estado sólo si la solicitud de inscripción abierta se basaba en repetidos actos de acoso o una condición de salud seria del estudiante que el distrito no puede responder adecuadamente. Todos otros rechazos deben apelarse ante el Tribunal de Distrito en el Condado de Polk

ELEGIBILIDAD ATLÉTICA:

En la mayoría de los casos, un estudiante de secundaria de inscripción abierta es inelegible para competencias atléticas de varsity durante primeros 90 días consecutivos de inscripción del estudiante en el distrito de recepción. Algunos, pero no todos, excepciones a esta regla general de inelegibilidad son los siguientes:

1. El distrito enviado no ofrece el deporte en cuestión.
2. El distrito enviado fue disuelta y se fusionó con uno o más distritos.
3. Las acciones de grado conjunto Distrito envía con otro distrito para el grado del estudiante.

TRANSPORTE:

Los padres/tutores de estudiantes abiertos de otro distrito escolar son elegibles para asistencia de transporte si el ingreso de los padres/tutores es igual o por debajo de las pautas federales de pobreza para el tamaño de la familia. Los dos distritos deben ser contiguos. Asistencia puede ser en la forma de transporte real o en forma de un estipendio de efectivo. Puede obtenerse información sobre la elegibilidad de transporte y una copia completa de inscripción abierta política del distrito y los procedimientos de la oficina de inscripción abierta, 1301 Second Ave., Des Moines, Iowa 50314

FROM THE SCHOOL NURSE

*******WE ASK THAT ALL PARENTS FOLLOW THESE GUIDELINES*******

Parents, please keep your child at home when you notice any of these symptoms:

Vomiting/Diarrhea: Consult your doctor if it lasts over 48 hours or sooner if you have a concern.

Eyes: Drainage or matting in eyes may indicate conjunctivitis (pink eye). You should contact your doctor. Child must be on an antibiotic 24 hours before returning to school.

Fever: Oral temperature 100 or higher. Your child should stay home until temperature is below 100 for 24 hours without fever-reducing medicine.

Lice/Scabies: Child can return to school after the prescribed treatment has been started.

Rash: Undiagnosed rash or itching.

Chicken Pox: Child can return to school in approximately 7 days from the onset of the rash if all blisters are crusted over and dry.

Sore Throats: Look into your child's throat. If tonsils are swollen, very red and/or white patches present, contact your doctor. If diagnosed with strep, your child must be on antibiotics 24 hours before returning to school.

*****PARENTS/GUARDIANS*****

Vision/height/weight/BMI screenings will begin soon. If you do not want your child to participate in any of these screenings, please contact the school nurse in writing. If we do not hear from you within a week from today, your consent is implied and we will include your child in the screening process.

HEARING SCREENINGS

Hearing screenings will be done on all children in February. If you do not want your child to participate in the screening program, please notify the school nurse in writing. Parents/guardians will be notified only if the results are abnormal.

Temperatures are changing - please remember to dress your child appropriately. Hats, gloves, scarves, warm coats for the cold days, snow pants and boots must be worn if your child wants to play in the snow during recess. The school does not have an abundance of extra clothing or jackets. We go outside every day during the winter months as long as the wind chill is 15 and above, and the playground has been plowed. If your child does not have the proper attire for the weather, they will not be permitted to play in the snow. If you need any assistance with winter clothing, please contact the nurse or the counselor. Thank you for your help!

LIBRARY NEWS

The Hubbell library is up and running once again and we are all looking forward to a wonderful year full of many reading adventures.

Your student has an assigned library day each week and has begun checking out books. There are a few policies that should be followed. The checkout period is for one week. Please encourage your child to return books on time so that other children can read them. Students may not check out new books until checked out books are returned or paid for (if lost or damaged). The charge for lost or damaged books is based on the cost and condition of the book. Your child is responsible for the care and return of the books. A backpack or book bag is a helpful way to transport books to and from school. When the book is at home, a good practice to follow is to keep the library book in the

student's backpack so it is kept away from pets, younger children, and the danger of damage from spills. It will be easier finding the book for library class if it is always returned to your child's backpack when finished reading.

We want all our children to enjoy reading. Read to your child daily or listen to your child read to you. Discussing what you and your child have read can be so beneficial to your child in building a variety of skills. I hope you had a restful summer and enjoyed many happy hours reading together.

CREATIONS FROM THE ART ROOM

Kindergarten has been busy learning about the elements of Art: Color, Line and Shape. They discovered Primary and Secondary colors and are exploring line and shape. We will be working on combining line, shape and color to create patterns and begin to explore texture.

1st graders have been exploring variety through line and pattern. They are creating an animal full of patterns that they will paint.

2nd graders explored rhythm, movement and color relationships using warm and cool colors and also learned what a pun is to create illustrations of birds or fish.

3rd graders connected with their unit, Where are in Place and Time, by creating a vehicle drawing. This vehicle combined a natural and man-made object and showed the environment they would like to explore in order to discover new things.

4th graders studied the classical elements of air, fire, earth, and water. We connected these 4 elements to sources of energy. Each student created 4"x4" mixed media representations of the elements, using line, shape, and color.

5th graders created folders that show one or two principles of design using lines and shape. They are now creating paintings inspired by nature.

K-5 Counseling

We started the first three weeks of the year with our Happy New Year lessons during classroom guidance which helped students focus on useful skills needed for success in school. Encourage them to continue meeting new friends and learning new things about them.

IB Update

The 2016-2017 school year is off to an awesome start! All grades have wrapped up their first unit of inquiry and are diving into their second. Some highlights from our first units of inquiry include:

Kindergarteners engaged in play-based learning to develop a better understanding of the structure of school. They also learned about the importance of routines and rules in the classroom, the hallways, the cafeteria, and more. Ask your Kindergartener if he/she can tell you about a rule at Hubbell and why it is important.

First grade dove into learning about how communities are interdependent and the roles people play in communities. Through engaging inquiry lessons, students were able to connect similarities and differences between home, school, and their larger community. Students also learned about communities that are different from their own. Take a moment to discuss the types of communities your family is a part of with your first grader.

Second grade students at Hubbell became amateur cartographers during their first unit as they learned how geography influences our experience of the world. Students engaged in learning experiences to discover unfamiliar geographic features/landforms and how they are formed. Students culminated their learning by building a 3 dimensional model of a selected geographic feature. Next time you are on a trip with your second grader, play *Geography I Spy*. I bet your child can spot several geographic features/landforms!

Third grade endeavored to find out how and why explorations can lead us to new understandings. They had the chance to explore the Red Feather Prairie and learn more about Iowa's habitats over time. Take a minute to see what they can tell you about Iowa's prairies.

Fourth grade put on their science caps to explore energy. They conducted experiments with miniature solar cars to determine what variables would affect its function. As social scientists, fourth graders also considered the impact human choice has on energy resources. See what your child's stance is on renewable vs. non-renewable energy sources. You may be surprised at the reasoning your child can offer for his/her point of view!

Fifth grade took a step back in time to discover how history can provide insights to the values of a community. Students used the American Revolution as a cornerstone historical event to better understand society at the time as well as the impacts to our society today. Can your child identify a Benedict Arnold of today? How about a Valley Forge?

Going Deeper with IB

This portion of the Hubbell Highlights is intended as a learning opportunity for our community. Each newsletter, I will highlight a different aspect of the International Baccalaureate (IB) program and what it means for you and your child. Hubbell teachers put in an immense amount of extra effort and time to ensure your children have a well-rounded education that prepares them for the 21st century. Hubbell mission statement:

"Hubbell Elementary School empowers lifelong learners to meet the challenges of tomorrow's global world."

How will we achieve this?:

One way is through modeling and teaching The Learner Profile. These are 10 traits we want everyone in the Hubbell community to embody.

Inquirer: Be an INQUIRER by developing a natural curiosity and a love for learning.

Thinker: Be a THINKER by making decisions and solving problems carefully and creatively.

Communicator: Be a COMMUNICATOR by respectfully sharing ideas and listening to others.

Open-Minded: Be OPEN-MINDED by appreciating perspectives, values, and traditions of yourself and others.

Caring: Be CARING by solving problems peacefully and keeping your hands, body, and objects to yourself.

Risk-Taker: Be a RISK-TAKER by exploring new things and defending your beliefs.

Balanced: Be BALANCED by getting involved mentally, physically, and emotionally throughout the day.

Principled: Be PRINCIPLED by following adult directions and taking responsibility for your words and actions
